What does it mean to be a Credentialed Teacher?

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What are Teacher Preparation programs?

- A California Credential is required to teach in California Public Schools. The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) sets teacher preparation standards, approves teacher preparation programs, and grants credentials.
- There are several types of teacher preparation programs:
 - Integrated Program: A program that combines course work for the baccalaureate degree and credential. This option is generally more intense than traditional programs but enables you to become a teacher faster.
 - Post-Baccalaureate: A program for college graduates which involves two or three semesters of coursework and student teaching.

What will I learn?

What type of Credential should I get?

- A Ca. Credential authorizes the holder to teach in a public school setting.
 - An individual who plans to teach in an Elementary School must obtain a Multiple Subject Credential.
 - An individual who plans to teach in a Junior/High School must obtain a Single Subject Credential. Credentials are offered in the following subject matters:
 - Agriculture
 - Art
 - Business
 - English
 - English Language Learner
 - Foreign Languages
 - Health Science
 - Home Economics
 - Industrial Technology Education

- Mathematics (Foundational)
- Music
- Physical Education
- Science
 - Foundational
 - Biology
 - Chemistry
 - o Physics
 - Geosciences
- Social Science
- An individual who wishes to teach students with Exceptional Needs (Special Education) must obtain an Education Specialist Credential.

What is Basic Skills Competency?

- The California Education Code and Title 5 Regulations specify, that applicants for a Credential, Certificate, or Permit to serve in the public schools of California must verify basic skills proficiency before the Credential, Certificate, or Permit will be issued.
 - You can meet basic skills by obtaining one of the following:
 - ► Take and pass all sections of the CBEST (California Basic Education Skills Test)
 - Meet the scoring on the one of the exams from the chart below

What is Subject Matter Competency?

- Teacher candidates in California are required to demonstrate competence in the subject matter they will be authorized to teach. This may be obtained in one of two ways:
 - 1. By examination -
 - ► Take and pass all sections of the CSET exams in your subject matter.
 - 2. Via subject matter waiver -
 - Obtain a Subject Matter Competency Waiver from a State Approved Waiver Program. This waiver is normally obtained from a bachelor degree level program. Check with the school you are planning on attending to see about programs available.

What are Basic Credential requirements?

Multiple Subject/Special Education

- Obtain a baccalaureate degree
- Satisfy the basic skills requirement
- Satisfy the subject-matter competence requirement
- Pass the Reading Instruction Competence Assessment (RICA)
- Satisfy the Developing English Language Skills requirement, including reading instruction
- Complete a course or pass an examination on the U.S. Constitution
- Complete a foundational computer technology course
- Complete a Commission-approved Multiple Subject Teaching Credential preparation program or a Commission-approved Special Education Teaching Credential preparation program

Single Subject

- Obtain a baccalaureate degree
- Satisfy the basic skills requirement
- Satisfy the subject-matter competence requirement
- Satisfy the Developing English Language Skills requirement, including reading instruction
- Complete a course or pass an examination on the U.S. Constitution
- Complete a foundational computer technology course
- Complete a Commission-approved Single Subject Teaching Credential preparation program

Preliminary Credential

- A preliminary credential is what a student will receive after successfully completing a teacher preparation program.
 - ► It is valid for 5 years.

Clear Credential

A clear credential may be obtained once a preliminary credential holder completes a 2 year induction program through their employing school district or a clear credential program from a university.

Teacher Shortage

- In California there is a shortage of teachers, according to the Learning Policy Institute (2016) it is estimated that 100,000 teachers are needed to fill the gap. The following fields are considered high need:
 - Special Education
 - Math
 - Sciences
- The Teach Grant is available to students who work in a high need teaching field. A student can obtain up to \$4,000 a year to help pay for their career in teaching.
- There may be other scholarships and grants available to assist in paying for your education through your chosen school.
- Your school of choice may offer a Teacher Residency Program which places students in a high need school to help reduce the achievement gap.

Teacher Credential Summary

- Apply/Transfer to a four year college/university to complete a Teacher Preparation Program
- Meet both Basic Skills and Subject Matter Competency Requirements
- Successfully complete the Teacher Preparation Program
- Apply for a Preliminary Credential
- Once teaching, enter an Induction or Clear Credential Program in that school district
